Nuggets Of Knowledge

If I had a dollar for every time that a person has come into my jewelry store, The Nugget, in the past thirtythree years and asked me to verify a stone from one of their trips out of the country, I would be retired and living in Tuscany! For example, on one Saturday, four people came in to the store, and each had a stone during a trip to South America. They were all told that the stone they were purchasing was an aquamarine. I tested the refractive index of each stone and had to inform them that, unfortunately, only one of them had an aquamarine. The other three had purchased blue topaz, blue spinel and blue glass.

Unfortunately, all light blue stones are not aquamarine and all dealers in gemstones overseas are not reputable. The overseas dealers also have the added advantage that very few people, when they are informed that they purchased something that wasn't genuine, are either too embarrassed to complain, or decide it just isn't worth the effort to try to get their money back. Even jewelers who go on buying trips overseas can be tricked or cheated in their purchases, because some testing equipment is very costly to transport with you, or may not be allowed to travel with you, as some tests require chemicals which would not be allowed by the current airport travel rules for traveling.

If is becoming more and more difficult with all the new technology that is available to treat stones with to really know what you are buying. Full disclosure is essential to require from those who sell you anything that costs more than what a souvenir might. My advice to travelers is, either know your meat or know your butcher. If you are not a GIA trained Gemologist, traveling with your own portable gem lab, you are definitely in a buyer beware position. This is especially true when traveling to South American countries. These countries are rich in gems and minerals, especially Emerald, Amethyst, Citrine, Aquamarine, Precious Topaz, and Ametrine (a combination of Amethyst and Citrine). The Emerald market was turned upside down about ten years ago due to the use of a material called Opticon which had been used in emeralds to treat seal fractures, without disclosing this to the gem purchasers.

Treating gemstones has always been done. In fact, during the time of Marco Polo, there are records of "heat treating sapphires" to improve their color. Many of these age old treatments are acceptable, just as it is acceptable to store opals in virgin olive oil to keep them from drying out, and to oil treat emeralds when they are mined, as there are natural oils and water in the earth from which they were mined, and to deprive these minerals from oil once they are unearthed could simply lead to the stones drying out and cracking. What is not acceptable is to color the oil which is used to treat the stones. Dealers who are not reputable will use green colored oil to "treat the emeralds", and if they do this treatment and do not disclose that they have done this, it is again a buyer beware situation. Gemologists know how to look for these kinds of treatments when examining emeralds prior to purchasing them, but innocent travelers do not.

There are also many laboratory grown stones which are true synthetics. By definition, a synthetic gemstone has all the same chemical and physical properties as the natural stone, except it has been grown in a laboratory, not by "Mother Nature." There are synthetic diamonds, emeralds, rubies, sapphires, tanzanites, amethysts, citrines, as well as many other gemstones. Some of the synthetic stones, such as synthetic emeralds, are grown with varying numbers of inclusions also, so just because a stone has eye visible flaws, do not assume that the stone is genuine. Also, the age of a stone is not always a defining

factor, since synthetic rubies and sapphires were developed in the late 1800's. These synthetic sapphires and rubies were set in many platinum and diamond pieces, especially during the Art Deco period in the 1930's. So, just because the ruby ring came from your grandmother's time is no guarantee that the ruby is genuine.

In the 1960's, General Electric developed and "grew" the first synthetic diamonds. Scientists in Russia, the USA and Japan are still working on perfecting various processes of growing a synthetic diamond. Crystal growing of diamonds in Russia was impaired by the frequent power interruptions, which interfered with the growth of diamond crystals. Now, many Russian and American scientists are working in labs in Florida universities trying to perfect the technique of growing synthetic diamonds. These stones have been useful for scientific and military purposes more so that for the jewelry trade. However, this is changing, and recently a company called Gemesis has been trying to develop a market for the synthetic fancy orange color diamonds that their company has produced.

This article is meant to alert you as a consumer, and not to alarm you. Knowledge is the key to all things, and my hope is that by imparting some gemstone information to this readership, there will be fewer travelers who are "scammed" when they go on their Caribbean cruises or their business travels. After thirty years in business at The Nugget, I've heard many a sad tale of purchases which went wrong overseas. I hope that by sharing a few "nuggets of knowledge", you will be spared those kind of experiences.

Is Your Dog WalKing You?

One of the complaints I hear most often from dog owners is that their dog does not walk nicely on leash. While it may be bothersome for pet owners who have a 10 pound miniature poodle, it's frustrating and can be unsafe for an owner of a 75 pound bouncing lab!

Here are some tips to help you shape your canine friend into an enjoyable walking partner.

• Reward your dog when he walks politely by your side. If your dog is behaving well, and you want him to continue this acceptable conduct in the future, you must remember to reward him for good behavior, and at least let him know when he is doing what you expect from him.

• If your dog tries to pull ahead while you are on a walk, simply stop! Don't encourage his efforts by following his lead. Instead, begin walking in the opposite direction and try to get your dog to follow along. Call his name when you switch directions, and when your dog catches up, reward him with a appreciative, "Good Boy!" (or girl).

• In order to get your dog to respond to your vocal commands, you must first practice getting your dog's

attention. If he starts pulling to get at something that is momentarily more exciting to him than you are, this is your cue to step it up a notch, and show your dog how fun you are! Try engaging in play while on your walks. Show your dog that walking with you can be an enjoyable experience, and he will be less likely to insist on roaming wherever he wants to.

 Teach your dog basic skills he will need on a normal walk, including how to greet strangers, both human and canine. It's not enough to teach your dog what not to do. You must teach him what you would like him to do instead before you can expect your dog to act appropriately. If you don't want your dog to lunge and pull when he sees a stranger, you must first show him how you want him to greet new people. Begin by instructing him to sit, make sure he remains patiently by your side, and let him greet the person when you give him permission.

• If you feel you need assistance in the training process, there are tools out there to help you. If you decide to purchase training tools, keep in mind these are designed to help you manage your training regiment, so do not expect the products to immediately fix the problem on their own. The following are examples of products on the market to assist you in dog training. The SENSE-ible Dog Harness is not like any regular dog harness. It is specifically designed to control your dog's shoulders, reducing his pulling strength. Another popular product is the Gentle Leader, a head collar that is designed to control the dog's head. With both products, your dog's body will follow where the head and shoulders lead. Both of these tools are designed to help you keep your dog's movements under better control, so you can spend more time enjoying a walk outside, instead of worry about where your dog wants to go.

Now that spring is upon us, it is a perfect time to get outdoors and start putting some of these tips to good use.
